2010 St. George's Caye Archaeology Project Report I - July 12-19, 2010

The 2nd Annual St. George's Caye Archaeology Project started July 12, 2010 and will run through mid August and will continue to look for pieces of the island's past. Leading the project are Dr. Jim Garber from Texas State University at San Marcos and Dr. Lauren Sullivan from the University of Massachusetts at Boston in partnership with Dr. Jaime Awe and the Department

of Archaeology and your Community Council of St. George's Caye.

The initial focus was to demarcate the exact locations of the historical burials and so the team began their research inside the cemetery boundaries. Several burials were found and the items presented here are some of the more interesting finds which includes buttons

from the 2nd and 5th West India Regiments, flintlock mechanisms and flint, pipes, and also turtle and manatee bones.

Jim & Lauren and 13 university students will be on the island through Aug 12 uncovering more of St. George's Caye's past. If you are interested in learning more about the project please ask anyone you may see digging holes on the island!

# WEST INDIA REGIMENT-

Reference: The St. George's Caye Archaeology Project: Results of the 2009 Field Season (Garber 2010) cites *Costumes of the Army of the British Empire, according to the last regulations 1812*. Engraved by J. C. Stadler, aquatint by Charles Hamilton Smith. The West India Regiment (WIR) was an infantry unit of the British Army recruited from and normally stationed in the British colonies of the Caribbean between 1795 and 1927.

The WIR soldiers became a valued part of the British forces garrisoning the West Indies, where losses from disease and climate were heavy amongst white troops.

The black Caribbean soldiers by contrast proved better adapted to tropical service. They served against locally recruited French units that had been formed for the same reasons. Free black Caribbean soldiers played a prominent and often distinguished role in the military history of Latin America and the Caribbean.

In 1795 commissions were issued to colonels to raise 8 such regiments and in 1798 4 additional regiments were raised.
